When we got home it was time to open presents








After a special dinner we all had birthday cake and went for another walk.

We did not have to wait very long before the hot water came spouting up out of the ground.








We had a picnic lunch while we watched the geyser spout a few more times.

Then we headed up the mountain. There were many twisty windy roads as we negotiated up higher and higher with very few guard rails.




The views were fabulous bit Mike did not get to see much as he had to keep his eyes on the road.

It was getting late in the afternoon so time to head for our last stop. On the way we passed a winery that was surrounded by thousands of tulips. What a fantastic display it was!






More trees covered with moss. The lady at the power display did not think that it would harm the tree. Sure hope she is right as there were so many affected!

Klamath Kamp on the edge of the Redwoods Forest. It was raining when we arrived so we set up quickly and headed inside to warm up.






Monday March 22, 2010

Drove through the parking lot and took pictures at this tourist place.










Tuesday, March 23, 2010

Passed by this train exhibit




Followed the river for a while


The front of the hotel and casino is indeed worth a look.
