Saturday September 27, 2008


Today we visited the famous Royal Tyrell Museum. The displays celebrate the long history and spectacular diversity of life - from the tiniest grains of pollen to the mightiest dinosaurs. The museum is Canada s only institution devoted entirely to palaeontology.

Set in the Alberta badlands, the Museum opened in September, 1985.

Four hundred thousand visitors were hoped for that first year. Nearly 600,000 came, and hundreds of thousands continue to visit each year.

Back at the campsite the bunnies continue to roam.




Sunday September 28, 2008
