
Wednesday April 29, 2009



Woke up to fog again, so delayed moving until 9:15 am. It was much warmer up to 12 C, and once the fog cleared the sun shine nicely. Noted that the Canadian dollar is now up to 83 cents American! Diesel prices around \$2.20 about half of what

we were paying last spring.

We stopped in North Platte to see the Golden Spike, a tower the locals put up to give people a bird's eye view of the Union Pacific train yards. As this is the centre of the United States, it has traditionally been a place where trains are sorted. It is the world's largest Railroad Classification yard, covering 2,850 acres (enough room to enclose 2,800 football fields).

About 3,000 cars are sorted daily on 18 receiving and 16 departing tracks. Trains are also repaired here with 3 acres of housing.

We had difficulty finding the 8 story tower as our GPS sent us to the wrong end of Homestead road (a dead end gravel road).

We finally found it by driving into town and following the signs.





Inside, on the first floor, we saw memorabilia, maps and model trains.





When we got to the top we looked down and saw our rig in the parking lot far below.



We were greeted by volunteers who answered our questions.

We chose number 27 and after setting up headed off to the bridge to see if we could see some of the migrating cranes that we read about in the travel books.









Unfortunately we were too late for the cranes, but we had a pleasant 2 mile hike and saw lots of other interesting things






The North Plate River is a perfect place for migrating birds.

Still avoiding the Interstate, the 2 lane roads took us north-east through rolling plains and many quaint little towns and villages.






We crossed lots of train tracks, but only had to stop a few times.

Friday May 1, 2009


In our book 1000 Things to See Before You Die, the Henry Doorly Zoo in Omaha was on the list and Travis highly recommended it, so off we went to see the animals.

Outside the sun was shining and the trees were blooming.


Inside our senses were treated to many sights, sound and smells (not all of them wonderful). Each section had its own unique way of showing off the creatures and plants.



















