A 100 foot long March of the Mounties sculptural procession runs the length of the main exhibit hall.


It demonstrates the evolution of the RCMP and Canada through transportation.






Tuesday September 16, 2008

Behind the ball diamond there is a little pond filled with ducks. Percy REALLY enjoyed watching the birds!




The view beside us was filled with old farming equipment

As we entered the badlands there were hills and more curves in the roads.






At 3 PM we arrived in Drumheller.
